COVID-19

Community Nutrition Kitchens provided 5.311 meals to 135 kids and 23 adults in locked down communities between June and August 2020.

Our Emergency Lifeline Halfway Home for Women, active from June to July 2020, allowed 23 women to complete a 14-day mandatory quarantine in a safe, women-only space.

Lito for Life, beginning in June 2020 and continuing to the present, provided 6,644 kilograms of nutrient-rich "super flour" made of ground and roasted wheat, soybeans, and corn to hospitals, health posts, assisted living facilities, local nonprofits serving populations at risk for hunger, and free food distribution points.

From April 2021 through September 2021, NYF provided a COVID-19 Isolation Center, including a highdependency unit, for individuals unable to quarantine safely away from family members. Our team provided life-saving care to 244 patients during this time, many of them children.

Access to Education established 80 digital learning centers in 4 rural municipalities between August and November 2020. allowing 9,684 children to continue their education during lockdown instead of falling behind.

For HIV required longmonths, she had to choose between paying Santosh's school fees and buying food - and Santosh term care at the Nev was on the verge of dropping out. Fortunately, the family was referred to NYF. They now have access to important resources, and Santosh is back in the classroom and doing well in his studies.

For young adults who prefer practical jobs training over academic paths, NYF's Vocational Education and Career Counseling program provides services from aptitude testing to resume building to vocational school scholarships. Through Olgapuri Vocational School (OVS), young people can access 3-month certification courses in high-demand trades like plumbing, electrical, welding, carpentry,

Rajesh*, 22, was working a grueling physical labor job in Malaysia when the pandemic hit. Returning home in early 2020 was hard, as his family relied on his income to make ends meet. When OVS brought a satellite carpentry course to his village, Rajesh signed up - and found he has a gift for furniture making! He and another graduate have now started a lucrative business together - and their work is incredibly popular in their local area.

afely at Olgapur During the COVID-19 pandemic, NYF's Olgapuri Children's Village campus has been one of the safest places in Nepal, with not one single case of the virus among the children. Children here have continued receiving top-quality education, loving attention, excellent health care, and more in a family-style environment.

Extended families receiving Kinship Care stipends have received close attention during the pandemic, with additional case-by-case support available to ensure good nutrition, stable housing, and educational access for the children in their care.

care at NYF-run Nutritional Rehabilitation Homes (NRHs) address pediatric malnutrition needs through-

out Nepal by providing medical and nutritional treatment to severely malnourished children and practical meal prep lessons to caregivers, emphasizing affordable, readily-available ingredients. Our flagship Kathmandu facility also serves as a learning center for health workers throughout the country.

services Nutritional Outreach Camps take NRH resources into some of Nepal's most isolated regions, providing health screenings, meal prep & nutrition workshops, and nutritional counseling to families without ready access to nearby hospitals. During the pandemic, Outreach Camps were held in areas of Kathmandu inhabited by families who have experienced the most severe of hardships. 167

The New Life Center (NLC) provides holistic treatment to children living with HIV/AIDS and their caregivers, including medical support, guidance on accessing free resources, tutoring, and psychological counseling. During the pandemic, care has been delivered from a distance to protect the health of these immunocompromised children.

Ram*, 20 months old, was referred to the NRH by a community nutrition organization. He weighed only 12 pounds - the average weight of a healthy 3-month-old in the U.S. Welcoming Ram just a few months before the pandemic began, the new parents had never been able to provide him with enough food to support healthy growth. After two months at the NRH, Ram had gained nearly 7 pounds - and his mother had learned how to sustain his growth. Both mother and child left the NRH healthier and happier! 1.951

Nepal's oldest children's counseling program, Ankur Counseling Center, provides psychological support to children experiencing mental illness, trauma, grief, and the

stress of the COVID-19 pandemic. They began offering services remotely when the pandemic began and haven't stopped since!

unately, Sailesh had an uncle and auntie who were eager to care for him. He has been living with them and his cousin-brother for most of his life. NYF began providing a Kinship Care stipend to the family in 2014, when expenses became overwhelming.

Sailesh is among the top ten students in his class, and support from NYF, including a donated laptop, has allowed him to manage distance learning during the pandemic. His cousin has been using the laptop to access his own classwork as well, and both boys are thrilled to be living safe together as they learn.

ment Forum (FKDF), the work continues to inspire us. NYF proudly provides world-class vocational training opportunities and academic scholarships especially for their community.

Kumari*

Kumari*, 24, worked as a kamlari for several years of her early childhood before being freed in 2012.

Recently, Kumari and several other women in their local FKDF coop group realized that if a group of them could learn industrial tailoring techniques together, they could support each other in a lucrative career without losing their sense of community and help prevent one another from being exploited in a factory setting. The group approached NYF about whether an industrial tailoring program could be taught through Olgapuri Vocational School (OVS) - and we were happy to help!

Kumari was part of the first group to attend this new training program, held in strict lockdown on the Olgapuri campus. After three months, local factory managers were so impressed that they hired the entire group, offering them an additional three months of on-the-job training. Kumari is now making a steady income, helping to support her family, and saving some of her earnings for the first time in her life. And she is doing so surrounded by supportive friends who speak her language and know how to advocate for women's rights!

Lila, 26, spent two years as a kamlari before she was identified and rescued by NYF. She launched immediately into her studies, already dreaming of becoming a nurse and a midwife.

Supported by NYF scholarships through her college career, Lila proved her strength and determination over and over until she finally landed her dream job at an Auxiliary Nurse Midwife at Bheri Hospital in Nepalgunj - the largest government hospital in the region. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Lila has been a frontline warrior at her hospital, providing critical life-saving care to her community.


